

For winter weed control in Lucerne

Jazz® contains metribuzin at 500 g/litre in the form of a suspension concentrate (SC). It is a triazinone (Group 5 herbicide), that works by inhibiting photosynthesis. It is primarily absorbed through the roots, although some foliar absorption will occur.

Jazz should be applied using conventional ground spraying equipment with a minimum 300 litres of water per hectare, maintaining agitation throughout mixing and during use.

WEED SPECTRUM

Susceptible weeds: Amaranthus (redroot), barnyard grass, charlock, chickweed, fathen, field speedwell, fumitory, galinsoga, groundsel, henbit, nettles, plantains, redroot, scentless chamomile, shepherds purse, spurrey, smallflowered buttercups, stinking mayweed, storksbill, twin cress, white campion, wild radish, wild turnip, willow weed, wireweed.

Moderately susceptible: Cornbind, sow thistle, seedling docks, seedling California thistle, summer grasses.

Resistant: Black nightshade, cleavers, docks, giant buttercup, most deep rooting weeds and most weeds over 4 leaf stage.

Jazz does have residual activity, so growers wishing to stitch grasses or undersown herbs into their Lucerne swards should wait at least 2 months following treatment. Residual activity is very dependent on rainfall and soil type, a small test area should be sown first if there are concerns about establishment.

APPLICATION

Jazz should be applied during dormant or semi-dormant periods of the crop; do not apply to lucerne stands less than 9 months old.

Use Rates:

On its own, use at 1500 mL of Jazz per ha.

Where perennial weeds are a problem apply:

- 750mL of Jazz + 1.6 litres of Atrazine (50%) per ha, or
- 750ml of Jazz + 2 litres Paraquat (20%) or 1.6 litres of Gramoxone (25%) per ha

These combinations show good control of Kentucky bluegrass (Poa pratensis) in Lucerne.

Paraquat gives control of most annual and perennial grasses, with Jazz improving control of the harder to kill grasses. If you have had a very dry winter where Jazz has not been well washed into the root zone, a grass weed herbicide like Millennium® can be used as a follow up in spring.

The Jazz label states not to use surfactants or wetting agents (this is more for sensitive and non dormant vegetable crops); one is needed to get the best out of Paraquat. Do not use penetrants.
